HAPPY 105th BIRTHDAY TO OUR LADY'S SCHOOL!

On Saturday the 12th of October our school will celebrate 105 years of Catholic Education in Sunshine. We are very proud of our school and thank God for all the blessings that have been given to Our Lady's over the 105 years. With the completion of the new building due on the 24th of October we have much to celebrate and look forward to as a vibrant school community. Below you can



see photos of the first principal Miss Mary Archer, the original school building and the first students who attended in 1919 when the school first opened.

1919

The history of Our Lady's school in Sunshine dates back to 1919 when Father John Carney quickly realised the urgent need for a Catholic school. He tost no time in proceeding with the work and the school was built at a cost of just over 366 pounds. His Grace, Dr Daniel Mannix, the Archbishop of Melbourne opened the school on the 12th of October 1919.



Miss Mary Archer was the school's first official principal from 1919 to 1921. In 1919 the school had 48 students. Miss Archer worked tirelessly at the school for two years and was remembered as a tall, well-dressed woman who taught the students songs and plays that they would perform in the town hall. Miss Archer lived in the city and travelled to Our Lady's school by steam train.



The opening of the School Hall in 1926 by Archbishop Daniel Mannix was a grand event attended by many students and parishoners.





In 1921 Miss Archer married and the second principal Miss Catherine Mc Mahon was appointed. Miss McMahon remained at the school for seven years and is remembered as being a dedicated and effective teacher. Each day she would choose an article from The Age Newspaper for use as a dictation piece for Grades 6, 7 and 8. Miss McMahon was very respected by the community and worked hard to provide an excellent education for all students who attended Our Lady's School.

During her time the school grew from the original 48 students to 112 students.

Preparation for 2025 Classes

At this time of the year the school is making arrangements for staffing and classes for 2025.

The process of creating the 2025 classes usually takes about a month and a great deal of time and energy goes into the decision-making process. We give the children a voice by asking them to list 6 children they would like to be in their class and we guarantee that each child will have one friend that they have listed.



Please take the time to talk to your child about who they will list as their friends and encourage them to think about listing children who will support them in their learning and help them to be a better learner in the classroom rather than someone they would like to play with. The staff work very hard to make sure that we provide a supportive and engaging learning environment for each child and this process plays a large part in this.

The class structure for 2025 will not change; we will still maintain two classes for each year level. None of the classes will be composite; they will all be straight classes from Foundation to Year 6.

As we are planning for 2025, we ask that parents let us know as soon as possible if their children are <u>not</u> returning to Our Lady's next year. We have had many inquiries about places for 2025 and we need to let these parents know if there are places for their children. **If your child is not returning in 2025 (apart from our current year 6 children) please let the Office know as soon as possible. Thank you for your cooperation.**

REMINDER - SCHOOL CLOSURE DAY NEXT WEDNESDAY

I am writing to remind you that next week on Wednesday the 16th of October there will be a School Closure Day which means that students will not be attending school on this day.

This Time In Lieu day has been approved by our governing body Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools (MACS) so that

the school can comply with the Catholic Education Multi-Enterprise Agreement 2022 which entitles teachers to receive time in lieu for attending after school events which are outside their normal 38 hour week and which are requested by the principal.

This includes school camps, attending the Sacraments (Reconciliation, First Eucharist and Confirmation), evening meetings held throughout the year and other events such as Dinner in the Yard.

We are almost finished!

There was much work completed over the school holidays. At the moment the focus is completing the new nature based playground which looks very exciting indeed.

The updated completion date is the 24th of October.













TRANSITION TO SUMMER UNIFORM

Just a reminder, that in the first 2 weeks of this term, students will be allowed to wear either the Winter or Summer uniform. This is because the weather can still be quite variable. We will then move into **Summer uniform only beginning in Week 3 on Monday the 21st of October.**

SCHOOL HATS IN TERM 4

During Term 4 all students will be required to wear a school hat and apply sunscreen when outdoors. This is an important way to ensure that our students are protected at all times from the harmful rays of the sun. The sunscreen we use at school is the *Hamilton Active Family SPF 50+*.

Please let your child's teacher know if your child cannot use this type of sunscreen and they will need to bring their own from home.








YEAR SIX LEADERSHIP BADGES

Complete your form today and the Teeth On Wheels team will be in contact to schedule your child's appointment and notify you on your eligibility. If you are not eligible, Teeth On Wheels will offer you a special deal of \$99 for the full check-up, oral cancer screening, clean, fluoride treatment and any x-rays if required (this can be claimed back through your private health insurance).

Helping your young perfectionist



There's a perception in our society that perfectionism is a good thing, akin to 'being perfect.' That it's something we should strive for or drop into conversation in job interviews... Yet the reality is quite different.

Perfectionism leads us to place unreasonably and often unrealistically high expectations on ourselves. Essentially, it causes us to raise the bar so high, that we frequently wind up feeling like failures, consumed by frustration and self-blame.

Of course, this can be very unsettling to witness in our kids and it can be hard for us to know how best to help. It can start when our children are very young and grow with them in intensity and impact. Perhaps you have a young child who refuses to draw because her drawings don't look exactly like those of an adult artist. Or maybe your little guy becomes so distressed by a small mistake in his homework, that he insists on starting all over again in his unhealthy quest for perfection.

If you have older kids, perhaps they refuse to submit an assignment because it's not perfect, or they won't run the cross country because they know they won't win.

While it's great for our kids to hold high expectations of themselves, aiming for perfection actually sets them up to fail. Their habitual 'all or nothing' thinking leads to the unhelpful belief that if they don't achieve 100%, they've as good as flunked. Their focus on their mistakes rather than on their successes often affects their self esteem, fuelling a vicious cycle that can lead to stress, depression and anxiety if left unchecked.

The sooner we help our kids break this unhealthy habit, the better. So let's look at a few tips for doing just that.

Reduce your praise

There are two ways in which we tend to praise children. '**Content praise**' often draws attention to the end product, for example, "What a fantastic drawing!", or to a fixed quality in a child, such as "You're so clever". In contrast, '**process praise**' focuses on how your child got there. When we use process praise, we draw attention to their good ideas, problem solving approaches, effort, persistence, concentration and enthusiasm.

While it's helpful for all children to experience more process praise than content praise, this is particularly true for children with perfectionistic traits. This allows us to draw the focus away from how impressive the end result might (or should) be and instead highlight the importance of having a go, trying their best and learning along the way.

For example, rather than saying, 'What a fantastic drawing! You're an amazing artist – what were you worried about?', it's more helpful to say something like, 'It's great to see you having a go at drawing. I love watching you try new things'; or, 'I love seeing the ideas you come up with when you draw'.

Of course, most of the time we needn't praise children at all. Saying simply, 'Drawing is fun isn't it?,' is often enough to provide children with that all important sense of connection.

Model making mistakes

At my children's school, they're taught to embrace 'flearning' – learning through failure. Admitted ly, my children witness me 'flearning' all the time at home, but in the eyes of your child, you might seem perfect. It's helpful for your kids to see that you make mistakes too, and importantly to learn through your modelling how mistakes can be managed.

Look for (or create!) opportunities to do this. When you're planning on bringing some spoons to the dining table, you could bring knives over instead and say, 'Oops, my mistake. Not to worry. I'll just go back and swap these over.' Or, perhaps you could draw alongside your toddler and deliberately keep from drawing inside the lines, commenting to your little one as you go, 'I love drawing with you'. By doing so, you model for your child that mistakes are okay, that they needn't hamper their enjoyment of a task and importantly, that the end result isn't all that matters.

Teach your child to speak to themselves as a friend

How does your child talk to themselves?

Would they speak to a friend in the same way?

No? Then what might they say instead?

We all know how much our inner voice can affect how we feel. Teach your child to be kind to themselves. To be supportive, forgiving and encouraging, even when they make mistakes.

Consider how you react when your child behaves in an 'imperfect' way

Do you respond calmly when your child accidentally spills cereal all over the kitchen bench or do you tend to overreact? It's important when we're teaching our children that they needn't be perfect, that our responses back this up.

By accepting our children as they are – wonderful, 'good enough' young learners – we teach them to do the same. And that's so much better than perfect.
