They're Back

It has come to my attention that some students in the school may have head lice and I seek your cooperation in checking your child's hair this week.

Head lice do not transmit infectious diseases – they are transmitted by having head to head contact with someone who has head lice. You may be reassured to know that head lice are commonly found in places other than at Our Lady's school. Head lice are common in school-aged children and are the most adaptable of creatures. They have survived living solely on humans for 10,000 years!

What can you do?

I seek your cooperation in checking your child's hair and in those instances where head lice or eggs are found, treating your child's hair.

Please see the attached information *Treating and Controlling Head Lice*, from the Department of Human Services. It is provides informative guidelines regarding detecting and treating head lice and eggs. If head lice or eggs are found on your child's hair you need to inform: the school and advise when the treatment has started, parents or carers of your child's friends so they too have the opportunity to detect and treat their children if necessary.

When can my child return to school?

Health regulations requires that where a child has head lice, that child should not return to school until the day after appropriate treatment has started. Please note, this refers only to those children who have live head lice and does not refer to head lice eggs.

Our Lady's School-Emergency Management Plan

I would like to reassure our parent community that Our Lady's School has an Emergency Plan which covers procedures for all possible emergency scenarios. Each year the staff are trained by our expert facilitators from EmQ. They also come out to our school and evaluate how well we carry out our drills and



emergency procedures. Today we will be conducting an Onsite Evacuation Drill. We invite you to discuss the importance of these drills with your child. We are committed to ensuring your child's safety at all times and in all circumstances.

The secretary records and distributes the notes of the meeting to all attendees and apologies.

Proposed agenda items must be emailed to the Chairperson / Deputy Chairperson / Secretary 1 week before the scheduled Board Meeting.

Role Descriptions

Chairperson

The Chairperson's position carries a task of trust and responsibility and requires skill and time. The Chairperson should exercise authority with tact, be impartial and open to other points of view.

The main role of the Chairperson is to:

- Be the main representative/spokesperson for the Parents Advisory Board
- Liaise with the Principal to finalise agenda items for the next meeting and advise the Secretary to distribute the agenda and required pre-reading at least 3 business days before the next meeting
- Be the main contact for agenda items
- Open the meetings punctually and ensure the agenda is followed
- Ensure those present at the meeting have the opportunity to discuss each item on the agenda prior to a decision being made
- Work towards a collaborative approach with other members of school community
- Be mindful of timelines, keep discussions on track and keep meetings moving

Deputy Chairperson

The responsibilities of this role will be to:

- Support the Chairperson in the coordination of the meetings (i.e. pre-reading / pre-work, etc.).
- Support the Chairperson in the running of the meeting by ensuring timelines are adhered to, and discussions are on track.
- Assume the responsibilities of the Chairperson or the Secretary in the event either one is unable to attend the meeting.

Secretary

The Secretary is very important to the efficient operation of the Parents Advisory Board.

Duties and responsibilities include:

- Taking minutes at Parents Advisory Board meetings
- Photocopying and distributing minutes to Committee members along with agenda prior to the next meeting
- Dealing with any incoming/outgoing correspondence

Committee Members

Committee members have a responsibility to:

- Attend Parents Advisory Board meetings as regularly as possible and send apologies if unable to attend
- Help organise Parents Advisory Board activities and projects
- Work towards the best possible outcomes being achieved
- Be mindful that discussions should be on topics which are relevant to the whole school community
- Facilitate and nurture positive home/school relationships within the parent community



RACV Street Scene incursion Year 2 and Year 4




All the students in Year 2 and Year 4 were visited by Robyn from the RACV Street Scene education program on Monday.








That's the Sound the Street Makes picture story book

Treating and controlling headlice

health

While children are at school many families will have contact with head lice. The information contained here will help you treat and control head lice.

Catching head lice

Head lice have been around for many thousands of years. Anyone can get head lice.

Head lice are small, wingless, blood sucking insects. Their colour varies from whitish-brown to reddish-brown. Head lice only survive on humans. If isolated from the head they die very quickly (usually within 24 hours).

People get head lice from direct hair to hair contact with another person who has head lice. This can happen when people play, cuddle or work closely together.

Head lice do not have wings or jumping legs so they cannot fly or jump from head to head. They can only crawl.

Finding head lice

Many lice do not cause an itch, so you have to **look** carefully to find them.

Head lice are found on the hair itself and move to the scalp to feed. They have six legs which end in a claw and they rarely fall from the head. Louse eggs (also called nits) are laid within 1.5 cm of the scalp and are firmly attached to the hair. They resemble dandruff, but can't be brushed off.

Lice can crawl and hide. The easiest and most effective way to find them is to follow these steps:

- Step 1 Comb any type of hair conditioner on to dry, brushed (detangled) hair. This stuns the lice and makes it difficult for them to grip the hair or crawl around.
- Step 2 Now comb sections of the hair with a fine tooth, head lice comb.
- Step 3 Wipe the conditioner from the comb onto a paper towel or tissue.
- Step 4 Look on the tissue and on the comb for lice and eags.
- Step 5 Repeat the combing for every part of the head at least four or five times.

If lice or eggs are found, the hair should be treated.

If the person has been treated recently and you only find empty hatched eggs, you may not have to treat, as the empty eggs could be from a previous episode.

Treating head lice

Treating head lice involves removing lice and eggs from the hair. There are two ways you can do this:

- 1. Buying and using a head lice lotion or shampoo, following the instructions on the product
- 2. Using the conditioner and comb method (described under 'finding head lice') every second day until there have been no live lice found for ten days.

If you choose to use a head lice product always read and follow the instructions provided with the product carefully. The following points may also be helpful:

- Head lice products must be applied to all parts of the hair and scalp.
- No treatment kills all of the eggs so treatment must involve two applications, seven days apart. The first treatment kills all lice; the second treatment kills the lice that may have hatched from eggs not killed by the first treatment.
- Cover the person's eyes while the treatment is being applied. A towel is a good way to do this.
- If you are using a lotion, apply the product to dry hair.
- If you are using a shampoo, wet the hair, but use the least amount of water possible.
- Apply the treatment near the scalp, using an ordinary comb to cover the hair from root to tip. Repeat this several times until all the hair is covered.

There is no need to treat the whole family - unless they also have head lice.

Concentrate on the head - there is no need to clean the house or the classroom.

Only the pillowcase requires washing - either wash it in hot water (at least 60°C) or dry it using a clothes dryer on the hot or warm setting.



Testing resistance

Head lice products belong in one of the following categories depending on the active compound they contain:

- pyrethrins
- synthetic pyrethroids (permethrin, bioallethrin)
- organophosphates (maldison or malathion)
- herbal with or without natural (non-chemical) pyrethrins.

Insecticide resistance is common, so you should test if lice are dead. If they are, treat again in seven days using the same product. If the lice are not dead, the treatment has not worked and the lice may be resistant to the product and all products containing the same active compound. Wash off the product and treat as soon as possible using a product containing a different active compound. If the insecticide has worked, the lice will be dead within 20 minutes.

Any head lice product could cause a reaction and should be used with care by women who are pregnant or breastfeeding, children less than 12 months old and people with allergies, asthma or open wounds on the scalp. If you are unsure, please check with your pharmacist or doctor.

Head lice combs

Combs with long, rounded stainless steel teeth positioned very close together have been shown to be the most effective, however, any head lice comb can be used.

Head lice eggs

Head lice eggs are small (the size of a pinhead) and oval. A live egg will 'pop' when squashed between fingernails.



Dead eggs have crumpled sides and hatched eggs look like tiny boiled eggs with their tops cut off.

Regulations

According to the Public Health and Wellbeing Regulations 2009, children with head lice can be readmitted to school or children's service centres after treatment has commenced.


The department recommends a child with head lice can be treated one evening and return to school or children's service centres the next day, even if there are still some eggs present. There is no need to miss school or child care because of head lice.

Preventing head lice

Check your child's head regularly with comb and conditioner. There is no research to prove that chemical or herbal therapies can prevent head lice.



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Treating and controlling head lice



Parents and carers are role models - is someone watching you?



RACV helps to teach children about road safety through the Street Scene program by providing qualified and specifically trained teachers to visit

These Traffic Safety Educators assist with classroom activities and in planning traffic safety education programs. As part of the RACV Street Scene program your child has taken part in a traffic safety session with their class.

Beyond the classroom, children often look to celebrities and sporting heroes as their role models, but when it comes to traffic safety the example set by parents and carers is vital.

Your behaviour as a road user can shape your child's behaviour now and in later years (and you know they're watching!).

Tips for being a traffic safety role model

- Practice safe crossing methods use pedestrian crossings when available, wait for the signal to cross at traffic lights, cross only when it is safe to do so and hold hands with children.
- Make it a rule to always put on your seat belt before driving off no matter how far you are going and drive safely.
- Take care when using public transport, particularly if crossing roads while getting on and off buses and trams.
- Wear a helmet and bright coloured clothing when riding bicycles, scooters, skateboards and rollerblades.
- Take care when dropping your child off at school or picking them up. Use the school crossing and park only where it is permitted.





Stop, Look, Listen and Think

Help your child learn how to cross the road safely and use pedestrian crossings when they are available. When using roads children up to about the age of 10 should be with an adult and younger children should always hold hands with an adult when crossing roads.

Activities for when out walking



Reinforce that your child should always choose a safe place to cross and then:







STOP one step back from the kerb

LOOK for approaching traffic in all directions LISTEN for approaching traffic

THINK about whether it is safe to cross

Planned walks

While out walking - help your child to make decisions about where to walk, where to cross and when to cross. Have them explain their reasons (remember to look for opportunities to give positive feedback).

Spot the sign

Use the opportunity while out walking to look for different road signs and discuss with your child what each sign means.

Talk about Traffic Safety

Use the opportunity while driving to and from school to talk about why it is important for everyone to always wear a seat belt, and why it is safer for children to be in the back seat and use the kerbside or 'safety' door when getting in and out of the car.

Running commentary

Talk about what is happening during the journey such as what other road users are doing, what hazards/dangers there are and what road rules apply. This will help your child to develop their skills in spotting hazards in the road environment.

GOSPE Lk 13:1-9

Some people arrived and told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with that of their sacrifices. At this he said to them, 'Do you suppose these Galileans who suffered like that were greater sinners than any other Galileans? They were not, I tell you. No; but unless you repent you will all perish as they did. Or those eighteen on whom the tower at Siloam fell and killed them? Do you suppose that they were more guilty than all the other people living in Jerusalem? They were not, I tell you. No; but unless you repent you will all perish as they did.

He told this parable: 'A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard, and he came looking for fruit on it but found none. He said to the man who looked after the vineyard, "Look here, for three years now I have been coming to look for fruit on this fig tree and finding none. Cut it down: why should it be taking up the ground?" "Sir," the man replied "leave it one more year and give me time to dig round it and manure it: it may bear fruit next year; if not, then you can cut it down."
