Dear Parent

I am writing to you to reassure you that the staff have been working very hard to make sure that in the event of a school closure your child will have access to continuous learning opportunities. I would like to take this opportunity to thank my dedicated staff for all the work they have been and are doing to ensure that we are fully prepared for a school closure.

We are fortunate to have the Seesaw app already in place to communicate with parents about their child's learning. In the event of a school closure



the Seesaw app will be the main form of communication between school and families. It is our goal to keep connected with all students and parents so that learning continues. We have arranged for a diversity of learning opportunities both on and off line. It is important that we keep these varied. I ask for parents' collaboration in this matter. Staff will be sharing what their usual day in the classroom looks like for you to follow if you wish. The staff are preparing the students by going over the learning tasks and sharing their expectations with the students so that they are aware and know what has been put into place for their learning to continue.

I would like to also inform you of further measures that the school will take as of tomorrow to ensure we are doing all we can to continue to meet challenges, during this difficult time of adjustment for everyone. I ask all students to bring their water bottles as they will not be drinking from the school taps. Students will have many opportunities to fill their water bottles as needed. The school will provide any child who does not have a water bottle with one.

Restricting people who come to our school to only the essential persons. This includes the suspension of the Music Bus lessons until further notice. The Music Bus will get in contact with families to communicate alternative arrangements. They are currently working on this and you will soon receive information from them about how to proceed from now on.

Parents to move quickly in and out of the school before and after school and not to enter the classroom. Also no children on the adventure playground either before or after school. Continue to communicate with your child's teacher or staff via email.

Continued reinforcing of best hygiene practice from school and home, as shared in previous correspondence

Reinforcing social distancing and talking about the importance of this with the students and also by rearranging the seating in classrooms and adding outdoor and larger spaces for use F-6.

The Bishops of Victoria have communicated that all masses and liturgies across the Melbourne, Sale, Ballarat and Sandhurst Dioceses have been suspended until further notice. You can continue to participate in the life of the Church, through activities such as time in personal and family prayer, reflecting on the Scriptures or participating in a Mass online - (http://bit.ly/MassOnDemand or https://melbournecatholic.org.au/Mass or www.wordonfire.org/daily-mass).

Not all of these initiatives reflect our normal practice. Our Lady's is a school which is hospitable to all but as you can understand we are responding to unprecedented challenges. The children's wellbeing is at the forefront of our minds and I thank both the parents and the staff for your understanding and cooperation. I know that staying cohesive and working together will ensure that we are doing the very best we can for each other and our community. Our Lady's Primary School has a long 100 year tradition of welcoming people from diverse cultural and linguistic backgrounds into our community.

This has been a very integral part of our school identity ever since its very beginning 100 years ago. We are a truly multicultural school and we consciously reach out and embrace the diversity of our community. Our most recent new arrivals have been the Burmese community. They have enriched our school with their presence.

For many of our Burmese families they have come from places of conflict or great challenges and are extremely grateful for the opportunity to be a part of our community.

To support their transition into a new country Our Lady's has asked the new families what they would like as well as partnered with Brimbank Council and VICSEG to look at ways we can support them. This year we have been able to offer English classes for all of term one and hopefully in term 2 to help our new families learn skills that will benefit them for a lifetime. This has been made possible thanks to a partnership with VICSEG. As a result we have received funding for an English teacher and childcare to run a weekly session for our Burmese community in Mariana Hall (next door to school) on Thursdays (from 9.00-12.00pm).

These have been well attended and helped us bring the community together to increase their sense of connection to the school and the spirit that is embraced and led by Our Ladies as a Catholic Community. Thanks to all of the people who have helped make this happen and the community that continues to join us in learning.

Amen





Dear Parents, Guardians and Carers,

Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. Leading the way for children during the Coronavirus pandemic





If you're like me, the news of the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic has your head spinning and your heart pumping. That's only natural as life as we know has taken a seismic shift in recent days.

International travel bans, cancellation of sporting and cultural events, shopping frenzies and talk of school closures continue to dominate the airwaves. Terms such as social distancing, self-isolation and social lockdowns have entered our vocabularies and may soon become part of our daily lives.

Coronavirus is having an unprecedented impact on our daily lives, and will probably do so for some time. While keeping ourselves and children healthy and safe is our main concern, it's also essential to address the anxieties of children and young people during these changing times. Here are some ideas to help inform, reassure and keep children and young people safe.

Build on what your children know

Children and young people have already been exposed to a great deal of information about corona virus through media, digital means and direct social contact. Their understanding will vary depending on their age and also the quality of their information sources so you probably will need to help kids process what they already know.

Casual conversations with teenagers and older children can be useful ways to glean their understanding. You could ask questions like "What are you hearing about Coronavirus? Is there anything you're not sure about?" Younger primary age children may need a more direct approach with parents addressing their specific concerns without giving too much information that can overwhelm them.

Check your own thoughts and feelings

Check your own frame of mind and emotions about COVID-19 before talking to kids. Most children are astute mood detectives and they'll gauge their safety by the way you communicate with them. If you tell a child, "You've got to wash your hands or you'll get infected," you are communicating your own anxieties, making it difficult for them to maintain a healthy state of mind. Have a think about how you can frame your instructions and their importance in a way that doesn't heighten your child's anxieties.

Stay informed

It's difficult to work out fact from fiction, correct from incorrect, information from exaggeration when the news is changing so fast. However you need to educate yourself about the virus itself, including how it's transmitted and how to stay safe. Get information from trustworthy sources such as The Australian Government Health Department website and the current federal government corona virus information media campaign.

Answer questions truthfully

It's important that parents and teachers answer children's questions honestly in age-appropriate ways and within context of what is happening at the given time. If their sport or hobby has been temporarily cancelled empathise with their concerns, while helping them maintain a sense of perspective.

Initiate positive action

One way to reduce anxiety and allay children's fears is to involve them in planning and preparation for their personal and group safety. Positive activities such as maintenance of personal hygiene, greeting people with an elbow tap and getting plenty of sleep can help restore a sense of control, that is so important for their wellbeing.

Find refuge in rituals

Regular rituals such as mealtimes, bedtime stories and regular one-on-one time provide both an anchor to normality and a sense of connection for kids at times of change. Consider reconstituting favoured family rituals at this time if they have lapsed due to lack of time, or lifestyle frenzy.

Look outwards


In difficult times there is a tendency to look inwards, which is a natural protective strategy. The alternative is to establish a sense of connection and community spirit by focusing on generosity and togetherness. Help children see past their own needs and look for ways to assist others whether it's shopping for an elderly neighbour, helping a younger sibling occupy themselves, or planning an indoor movie night for the whole family.

The Coronavirus presents many practical challenges to parents and other important adults in the lives of kids. Staying calm, keeping informed, and adjusting our own habits are just some of the challenges we face. However a significant challenge is one of personal leadership. That is, during these difficult times we need to be civil to each other, look out for each other and be mindful of the common good in everything we do. In this, we can all take a significant lead.










Jesus heals the blind man

GOSPE Jn 9:1.6

Jn 9:1.6-12.35-38

As Jesus went along, he saw a man who had been blind from birth. Jesus spat on the ground, made a paste with the spittle, put this over the eyes of the blind man and said to him, 'Go and wash in the Pool of Siloam' (a name that means 'sent'). So the blind man went off and washed himself, and came away with his sight restored.
