

#### WHY LEARN A LANGUAGE?

WHY LEARN A LANGUAGE?
Learning a language has been shown to have many benefits, including enhancing creativity, problem solving ability, iteracy, sellis and the maintenance of cultural identity in recognition of the importance of languages, Victorian students receive a brouns towards their Australian Tentroy Admission Rank (ATAR) score for successful completion of a VCE accredited language, Languages provide advantages for employment, whis increasing numbers of comparises seeking bifurnity lingual speakers to remain competitive in an interconnected global world. Languages and to Australia's economic wealth and security, and increase the capacity to communicate in a range of forums and situations. Students who complete a brill 34.4 sequence in VCE Language's may be eligible for the award of the Victorian VCE (Baccasurvaste) - check eligibility requirements.

#### HOW MANY LANGUAGES CAN LCHOOSE

Currently, more than 50 languages are available at the VSL. For a full list refer to the opposite page.

#### WHERE AND WHEN CAN I LEARN A LANGUAGE?

The VSL offers face-to-face classes at over 40 Centres in Melbourne, Geelong and regional areas. Most classes operate on a Saturday, from 9am to 12.20pm. Some weelrnight classes operate after school hours. Classes are not susually held during school vascations, on public holidays, or on a long weekend.

#### AM I ELIGIBLE TO ENROL?

The VSL enrols students from Years F to 12 (VCE) who are unable to study their language of choice at their home school. Students from all educational sectors (Government, Independent and Catholic) are eligible to enrol. Currently more than 16,000 students learn a language with VSL.

Adults may entrol to study the language at VCE level only, if there are vacancies. Adult students must obtain a satisfactory police record check. Where available at Centres and via Distance mode, secondary students and adults may enrol in a "Certificate of Larguage" course as an alternative pathway to VCE. This is a rathorally accelled qualification provided under the VSL's auspice as a Registered Training Organisation.

As part of the Department of Education & Training (DET), the VSL is a government funded school. The VSL offers quality courses aligned with government curriculum standards and makes language education both accessible and affordate for all Victorian students. To assist with the cost of notes, class sets, photocopying, curriculum materials and other administrative expenses, a small annual contribution is requested.

#### WHO WILL BE MY TEACHER?

WHO WILL BE MY TEACHER?

The VSL is the largest single provider of languages in Victoria. The VSL seeks to employ quality staff, with qualifications, expensione, professional registration and the capacity to make learning a language an engaging and meaningful pursuit. A range of toaching and delivery methods are employed to cate for our diverse student learning styles and needs. Teachers regularly undertake professional training and development as part of their employment with the VSL. The curriculum is aligned with government elucutional frameworks and standards including the Victorian Curriculum Framework and VCE study designs. Student reports are issued twice per year. Excellent achievements by VSL students are demonstrated annually by the large numbers who gain perfect VCE scores, too scores in the upper percentile range and students who receive Premier's Awards.

#### HOW DO I ENROL?

All students who are Australian citizens or who have residency status must complete an online VSL Enrolment on the VSL verbelte.

VCE students: Years 11 and 12: Full time students at home school should apply for VCE entry first through the VSL dar Assessing School Notification Form will be provided for the home school). Non-school based students wishing to present for VCE assessment must make the application through the VSL. It is the responsibility of all VCE students to ensure their enrolment is confirmed through their home school.

International students may errol in VSL courses through their home school. The International Education Division will inform students of the errolment process and identify documents needed to accompany the errolment. International students enrolled in TAFE colleges or non-government English language centres are regarded as students of non-government schools and must pay the full fee prior to enrolment.

Classes are established subject to sufficient enrolments, availability of staff and other DET requirements. If a class is accessed by the VSL and stakether earnet be allocated to other classes, a refund will be made in full. In other cases, refund applications read to be made within the first three weeks of commencement of classes and a service fee will be deducted.

### Helping your child avoid being cyberbullied



Cyberbullying of children and teenagers is one of the greatest fears facing parents today. The thought of their child being subjected to heinous words, threats to their physical safety, as well as their social and emotional wellbeing, is something no parent wants their child to experience.

Most of the bullying behaviours we now see are happening from behind a keyboard, playing out in social media feeds and gaming chat rooms. It is little wonder parents feel overwhelmed and out of their depth, especially when for most, online is an environment that is relatively unfamiliar.

So what can we do to help our kids avoid these types of behaviours, as well as give them the skills to deal with cyberbullying behaviours should they be exposed?

#### Remind them of all of the things they have control over

While it may not feel like it, we have a lot of control over what happens online. We can determine who we talk to, what we ignore, what we share, how we comment, who we follow, who we block or hide from our feeds. All of that, helps us determine who is allowed to play a role in our online experiences and ultimately what behaviours we accept on our feeds

#### Give your child time away from the screens

Everyone needs a break from screens. We want to encourage regular times when a child doesn't need to be tethered to their device. Building a wider community away from the screens helps a child or teen build their sense of self worth. Keeping devices away from the dinner table also gives them a break from being socially switched on and allows the to connect with family without a device. Removing devices at night helps their active brains to switch off, and prepare for sleep.

#### Role play possible responses

Discuss with your child whether whether they should respond to bullying or nasty online comments, If they do, then consider how they could respond. Consider the statements or types of people they ignore, block or report.

#### Regularly check the privacy settings

Every app, game and social network has a settings button that enables you to determine how positive an experience your child can have on that platform and how much control they have. Visit these settings regularly to look at the options available

While nothing is guaranteed particularly when it comes to the online world, we can certainly be taking steps to help our kids. We can give them skills, encourage positive behaviours and thinking that allow them to minimise their exposure to the bullying behaviours of others.

# GOSPE Mt 3:1-9, 11

In due course John the Baptist appeared; he preached in the wilderness of Judaea and this was his message: 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand.' This was the man the prophet Isaiah spoke of when he said:

A voice cries in the wilderness: Prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight.

This man John wore a garment made of camel-hair with a leather belt round his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. Then Jerusalem and all Judaea and the whole Jordan district made their way to him, and as they were baptised by him in the river Jordan they confessed their sins. But when he saw a number of Pharisees and Sadducees coming for baptism he said to them, 'Brood of vipers, who warned you to fly from the retribution that is coming? But if you are repentant, produce the appropriate fruit, and do not presume to tell yourselves, "We have Abraham for our father," because, I tell you, God can raise children for Abraham from these stones. I baptise you in water for repentance, but the one who follows me is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to carry his sandals; he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire.
