It was great to see so many parents participate and readily engage in conversation about what they believe is most important for their child/children to learn. A big thank you to all of you who attended, the staff really enjoyed hearing your ideas and getting to know you a little better. We value the parent voice and are very keen to gather as many ideas from parents as we possibly can before the two day conference on July 16th and 17th in Term 3. We are currently gathering data from all sections of our school community (parents, students and staff) to use during our two day conference to inform our new curriculum design.

The next Community Learning Conversations meeting is on tomorrow, Friday 15 June between 8.00am and 8.45am in the Hall Kitchen. Tea, coffee and croissants will be served at the meeting for all participants to enjoy.

Written Reports Update

Last year Our Lady's school redesigned the written reports and we had a very positive response from the parent community in relation to the new format. The new format reflects our RE focused contemporary approach and the Victorian Curriculum which has enabled greater flexibility to personalise the report and the progression of learning for each child. We hope that when reading the written reports you not only get a clear picture of your child's progress in curriculum areas but also a sense of how your child is progressing as a learner and as a member of the Our Lady's school community.

This year we are reporting to a new area of the Victorian Curriculum, Digital and Design Technologies. The students in Foundation Year One, Three and Five will have their achievements reported on in Digital and Design Technologies in Semester 1. Students in Year Two, Four and Six will have their achievements in Digital and Design Technologies reported on in Semester 2. We have included a Michael Grose article in this edition of the newsletter which we hope will help you when speaking to your child about their report.



Reading your child's report

Reports can mean anxious times for children. Will my parents be disappointed or proud? This is the main concern of most children.

Could try harder . . . always does her best . . . lacks concentration . . . easily distracted . . . a pleasure to teach . . .

Do these comments, taken from a batch of student reports sound familiar? Student reports bring mixed feelings for parents. Pleasure and pride if they are performing well but considerable angst when children are not progressing as you hoped.

Reports can mean anxious times for children too. Will my parents be disappointed or proud? This is the main concern of most children. Kids of all ages take their cues from their parents, so your reaction to their school report can affect the way they see themselves as learners and as people.

Before you rip open the sealed envelope containing the report do a little self-check to see if you are in the right frame of mind:

1. Are your expectations for your son or daughter realistic and in line with their ability?

Expectations are tricky. If they are too high then kids can be turned off learning. Too low and there is nothing to strive for. Pitch your expectations in line with your child's abilities. A quick check of your child's last report cards may provide you with a good yardstick.

2. Do you believe that children learn at different rates?

There are slow bloomers, late developers and steady-as-you-go kids in every classroom, so avoid comparing your child to siblings, your friends' children and even yourself when you were a child. Instead look for individual progress.

3. Are you willing to safeguard your child's self-esteem rather than deflate it?

Self-confidence is a pre-requisite for learning, so be prepared to be as positive and encouraging as possible.

School reports come in different formats. Some are prescriptive while some use grading systems such as A, B, C, etc. with room for teacher comments. Regardless of the format school reports should provide you with an idea of your child's progress in all subject areas, their attitude and social development.



Here are some ideas to consider when you open your child's report:

- **Focus on strengths.** Do you look for strengths or weaknesses first? The challenge is to focus on strengths even if they are not in the traditional 3Rs or core subjects.
- Take into account your child's effort and attitude to learning. If the report indicates that effort is below standard, then you have something to work on. If your child is putting in the required effort, then you cannot ask any more than that, regardless of the grading.
- **Broaden your focus** away from academic performance to form a picture of your child's progress as a member of a social setting. How your child gets along with his or her peers will influence his happiness and well-being, as well as give an indicator to his future. The skills of independence and co-operation are highly valued by employers so don't dismiss these as unimportant.
- Take note of student self- assessment. Kids are generally very honest and will give a realistic assessment of their progress. They are generally very perceptive so take note of their opinions.
- **Discuss the report** with your son or daughter talking about strengths first before looking at areas that need improvement. Ask for their opinion about how they performed and discuss their concerns.



After reports are read and discussed celebrate your child's efforts with a special activity or treat. In this way you will recognise progress and remind them that the holidays are just around the corner when they can forget about assessment, tests and reports for a while.

The smallest seed becomes the biggest shrub



11th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B

Gospel

Mk 4:26-34

Jesus said to the crowds, 'This is what the kingdom of God is like. A man throws seed on the land. Night and day, while he sleeps, when he is awake, the seed is sprouting and growing; how, he does not know. Of its own accord the land produces first the shoot, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear. And when the crop is ready, he loses no time; he starts to reap because the harvest has come.'

He also said, 'What can we say the kingdom of God is like? What parable can we find for it? It is like a mustard seed which at the time of its sowing in the soil is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; yet once it is sown it grows into the biggest shrub of them all and puts out big branches so that the birds of the air can shelter in its shade.'

Using many parables like these, he spoke the word to them, so far as they were capable of understanding it. He would not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything to his disciples when they were alone.
